1 p. om båda svarsdelarna visar att examinanden har grundläggande insikter i ämnet.

### Ett fullpoängssvar innehåller:

- a) – en garanti för regnfria bröllop / en garanti om vackert väder på bröllopsdagen (1 p.)
  - systemet har inte testats i praktiken (1 p.)
- b) – förmedla/langa/sälja droger/narkotika (1 p.)
  - en polis som inte var i tjänst (1 p.)
- c) – den (var ett bruksdjur som) hjälpte mot ångest (1 p.)
  - för att inte ställa till med problem för de andra matgästerna / det hade kommit klagomål på den (1 p.)

Stöddjur, servicedjur, hjälpdjur, bruksdjur, tjänstedjur. EJ: tjänstehund, husdjur.

- d) – man bygger egnahemshus/enfamiljshus i stället för små bostäder / man bygger fler egnahemshus/enfamiljshus (1 p.)
  - det är inte många som hittar en bostad till lämpligt pris (1 p.)
- e) – en grupp fastighetsförmedlare (1 p.)
  - eftersom de också hade haft låg lön då de var unga (1 p.)
